A Resolution expressing support for the Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act of 2017 which will close an existing loophole in federal law that shields website companies from liability for illicit content posted by third-party users, even when such content facilitates criminal conduct like illegal sex trafficking, and urging the United States Congress and President Donald Trump to support the same, for the Executive and Council, and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, from 2010 to 2015, reports of suspected child sex trafficking to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children increased by more than 800 percent, a spike they found to be "directly correlated to the increased use of the internet to sell children for sex."; and

WHEREAS, one 2012 analysis by the Advanced Interactive Media Group found that more than 80 percent of all revenue from online commercial sex advertising in the U.S. was generated by the website Backpage; and

WHEREAS, while Backpage's use as a platform for illegal sex trafficking has been understood for years, a recent report released in January of this year by the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations found that the company knowingly and actively facilitated criminal sex trafficking, making Backpage far more complicit in these crimes than previously thought; and

WHEREAS, despite these facts, Backpage has escaped legal justice in countless lawsuits brought by sex trafficking victims and prosecutors. The company has been shielded by a 1996 law called the Communications Decency Act because courts have ruled that that the law protects companies like Backpage from liability for illicit content that third-party users post on its website, even if it facilitates criminal conduct like illegal sex trafficking; and

WHEREAS, in July 2017, Ohio Senator Rob Portman (R) and 27 other Senators from across political aisles, including fellow Ohio Senator Sherrod Brown (D), introduced the Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act; and

WHEREAS, the Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act will make three common-sense reforms to the Communications Decency Act. 1) It will allow victims of sex trafficking to seek justice against websites that knowingly facilitate crimes against them by removing the law's unintended protection for online sex traffickers. 2) It will help law enforcement by allowing the prosecution of websites that knowingly assist, support or facilitate a violation of already existing federal sex trafficking laws and 3) It will enable state law enforcement – not just the Department of Justice – to take legal action against businesses that violate federal sex trafficking laws; and

WHEREAS, this Council finds and determines, after reviewing all pertinent information, that it is necessary and in the best interest of the County of Summit to support the Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act of 2017 and urges the United States Congress and President Donald Trump to support the same.

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NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the County of Summit, State of Ohio, that:

SECTION 1

This Council hereby expresses support for support the Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act of 2017 so that companies can be found liable for illicit content that third-party users post on its website such as content related to illegal sex trafficking.

SECTION 2

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The Clerk of Council is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Resolution to the United States Congress and President Donald Trump.

SECTION 3

This Resolution is hereby declared an emergency in the interest of the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the County of Summit and for the further reason that it allows this Council to express support for the Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act of 2017 and urges United States Congress and President Donald Trump to support the same.

SECTION 4

Provided this Resolution received the affirmative vote of eight members, it shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and approval by the Executive; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force at the earliest time provided by law.

SECTION 5

It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.
