5 6 7 8	WHEREAS, in 1965, Congressman Lewis led the Selma to Montgomery marches across the Edmund Pettus Bridge. In an incident which became known as "Bloody Sunday", armed Alabama police attacked unarmed civil rights demonstrators, including Lewis, fracturing his		
9 0 1	skull. Images from that day shocked the nation and galvanized support for the Voting Rights Act of 1965, signed into law by President Lyndon B. Johnson; and		
2	WHEREAS, Lewis, a Democrat who served as the US representative for Georgia's 5th Congressional District for more than three decades, was widely seen as a moral conscience of		

WHEREAS, Lewis, a Democrat who served as the US representative for Georgia's 5th Congressional District for more than three decades, was widely seen as a moral conscience of Congress because of his decades-long embodiment of nonviolent fight for civil rights. As a child, he wanted to be a preacher, and as a young man, he fulfilled his dream of becoming an ordained minister. His passionate oratory was backed by a long record of action that included, by his count, more than 40 arrests while demonstrating against racial and social injustice; and

WHEREAS, as follower and colleague of Martin Luther King Jr., Congressman Lewis participated in lunch counter sit-ins, joined the Freedom Riders in challenging segregated buses and – at the age of 23 – was a keynote speaker at the historic 1963 March on Washington. Angered by the unfairness of the Jim Crow South, he launched what he called "good trouble" with organized protests and sit-ins. In the early 1960s, he was a Freedom Rider, challenging segregation at interstate bus terminals across the South and in the nation's capital; and

WHEREAS, despite the "Bloody Sunday" attack and other beatings, Lewis never lost his activist spirit, taking it from protests to politics. He was elected to the Atlanta city council in 1981, then to Congress six years later; and

WHEREAS, during his career in Washington, he focused on fighting against poverty and helping younger generations by improving education and health care. He also co-wrote a series of graphic novels about the civil rights movement, which won him a National Book Award; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Lewis was born on a Troy, Alabama, cotton farm into a segregated America on February 21, 1940. In his lifetime, he lived to see an African American elected president, and in 2011, after more than 50 years on the front lines of the civil rights movement, Lewis received the nation's highest civilian honor, the Presidential Medal of Freedom from that President, Barack Hussein Obama.
