Let's Move Summit County Hosts 3rd Annual Health Walk at Akron Zoo



More than 400 walkers participated in the Let's Move Summit County 3rd Annual Health Walk on Saturday, May 28 at the Akron Zoo.

On a gorgeous Memorial Day weekend, more than 400 walkers participated in the Let's Move Summit County 3rd Annual Health Walk, held on Saturday, May 28th at the Akron Zoo. Summit County Councilwoman Paula Prentice (District 8) led the effort, which was dedicated to Infant Mortality Awareness this year.

Prentice along with Councilwoman Gloria Rodgers (District 3) are both actively involved in local efforts to decrease the infant mortality rate in Summit County, which ranks among the highest in the State of Ohio. The issue is particularly troubling in African-American households where the infant mortality rate is twice as high as other races.

"Our goal was to provide some information and spark discussion about healthy outcomes for expectant mothers and newborns while providing a fun and family friendly walk for everyone," said Prentice. Following the walk, there was a brief presentation on infant mortality from the Summit County Health Department and doctors from Summa Health. Cleveland Clinic Akron General and Community Support Services walked among the participants on the route to talk about health issues and answer questions.

A FREE event open to the public, walkers had the option to walk a half-mile zoo only route or complete a 3.25 mile community route that began and ended at the zoo.

In addition, all pre-registered walkers received a t-shirt and drawstring sport-pack, and all walkers received FREE admission to the Zoo that day. County employees earned up to 250 Vitality points for participating.

Event sponsors and health vendors were also available with additional information and samples at the Zoo and a prize drawing was held following the walk.

LeBron James Honored by Council for NBA Championship, Foundation Work





Prior to the June 27th Council Meeting, Akron native and NBA Superstar LeBron James was honored by Council and the Executive for leading the Cleveland Cavaliers to the 2016 NBA World Championship, the first major professional sports title for Northeast Ohio in 52 years! James was named Finals MVP, leading both teams in scoring, rebounding, assists, steals and blocks. His LeBron James Family Foundation sponsors 3rd grade students in its Wheels for Education program and established the I Promise Network with the Akron Public Schools to ensure their success through graduation. James has also established a partner-ship with the University of Akron ensuring college scholarships for thousands of his program's students and he has teamed up with Boys and Girls Clubs across the nation, providing donations and renovations so that kids will have safe places to learn and play before and after school. The Commendation was read into record by Councilman John Schmidt (District 2) as James was unable to attend.

Councilman Wilhite, Executive Pry Introduce Fuel Pump Security Legislation

At the Monday, June 27th County
Council meeting, Summit County
Councilman Jeff Wilhite (District
4) along with County Executive
Russ Pry, introduced legislation
(Resolution 2016-272) to curb the
use of "scimming" devices on credit
card readers on gas pumps
throughout Summit County.

In recent years the prevalence of devices commonly called credit card "skimmers" has increased. Many skimmers are placed in the scanning device of gas pumps at retail gas stations, stealing credit card information of unsuspecting consumers. Through many inexpensive and cost effective means,

consumers can easily be made aware of any tampering to the scanning device of gas pumps at retail gas stations. While a few retail gas stations have begun to implement policies and procedures to ensure the security of the scanning devices on their gas pumps, (see security tape in photo at right) currently, no regulations or consumer protections exist to protect consumers from credit card skimmers at retail gas stations in the State of Ohio.

The proposed legislation would enact Chapter 780 of the Codified Ordinances of the County of Sum-

mit, entitled "Fuel Pump Security," to provide consumer protection from credit card skimmers at retail gas stations. This new proposed chapter would include: tamper prevention measures for gas station owners; civil penalties and



costs for non-compliance; administrative hearing procedures for civil penalties; out of service and devices without scanners exceptions and fiscal office inspections on devices.

"We recognize that consumer protection from credit card skimmers is necessary to prevent financial losses and maintaining consumer confidences of the integrity of the scanning devices at our retail gas stations," said Wilhite.

Resolution 2016-272 will be reviewed for adoption and approval in August when Council returns from Summer Recess. If passed, consumers can expect to see these measures at every gas station in Summit County on January 1, 2017 when this ordinance would go into effect.
